The Caldwell Veterans' Memorial Hall became the recipient of donated chairs, tables, desks and a copier when the Caldwell Public Library underwent a recent renovation and upgraded their furniture.



Nearly 8,500 volunteer hours have been invested in the demolition activities to prepare the building for construction activities. Volunteers, like Larry Kelly have donated not only labor but a truck and trailer to haul recyclables to the recycling center and to the landfill. Larry single handedly removed the old ceiling tiles from the basement addition.

The City of Caldwell purchased the old Carnegie Library building, which is located at 1101 Cleveland Blvd, from the Caldwell School District and agreed to designate it as the Caldwell Veterans' Memorial Hall. Under a 100 year lease agreement with the City of Caldwell and the Caldwell chapters of the Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars



## Where are the Canyon County Veterans?

The 2012 census identified 123,600 veterans living in Idaho, of that 14,470 live in Canyon County, 12% of the veteran population. Of this group of veterans 2,590 or 17.9% have disabilities, 1,534 are disabled female veterans. It is estimated that there are 57,880 family members also impacted by the lack of adequate programs and services. The long-term projected outcome of the Caldwell Veterans' Memorial Hall is programs and services that directly contribute to improved conditions and quality of life for our veterans. The efficient and effective execution of programs and services will give veterans the skills, knowledge, positive behavior and confidence to be an active participating member of the community.

## U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary: A Proud Tradition, A Worthy Mission

For over 70 years, tens-of-thousands of men and women of the Coast Guard Auxiliary have spent millions of volunteer hours helping the Coast Guard carry out its mission. They have saved countless lives through their work, on and off the water. Auxiliarists are probably best known for educating the public through their boating safety classes and vessel safety checks. Yet, they do much more. The Coast Guard Authorization Act of 1996 allows the Auxiliary to assist the Coast Guard in performance of any Coast Guard function, duty, role, mission or operation authorized by law and authorized by the Commandant.

The Vessel Safety Check (VSC) is a free examination available to any recreational boater. VSCs help boaters ensure their craft complies with Federal regulations regarding safety equipment requirements.

As for education, the Auxiliary teaches boating safety to recreational boaters of all ages. The Auxiliary offers Boating Skills and Seamanship (geared toward power boaters) and sailing courses (for sail-boaters) as well as basic and advanced navigation courses.

The Auxiliary operates safety and regatta patrols and is an integral part of the Coast Guard Search and Rescue team. Auxiliarists also stand communication watches, assist during mobilization exercises, perform harbor and pollution patrols, provide platforms for unarmed boarding parties and recruit new people for the Service.

The Auxiliary has members in all 50 states, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Guam. Membership is open to men and women, 17 years or older, U.S. citizens of all states

and territories, civilians or active duty or former members of any of the uniformed services and their Reserve components, including the Coast Guard.

Special 50th Anniversary commemorations of the Viet Nam war will feature screenings of the documentary BRAVO: Uncommon Men / Uncommon Valor in the spring of 2015. This moving film captures the realities of combat through the eyes and graphic recollections of 15 marines who experienced the unabated siege of marine combat base Khe Sanh, Viet Nam lasting an unprecedented 77 days. It is the story of young men in battle, young men whose commitment to their brotherhood still shines through nearly 50 years later. It is, of course, not only the history of a particular event, but also a clear message to all who would serve and assist those returning home from war. This is the real message and the critical importance of seeing this film. That and the long postponed tribute owed to those who served and those who continue to serve our nation, when and where we send them.

## VETERANS HOMELESS STAND DOWN TO BE HELD IN NAMPA

## HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE THE VA TO PROCESS A CLAIM?

As of December, the Boise VA Regional Office has 1,666 disability claims pending an average of 102 days. Of those, 502

(30%) have been pending more than 125 days, and only 21 (1.26%) have been pending more than one year.

In November and December, the VA Regional Office conducted 732 personal interviews with an average wait time of less than two minutes. The worst time to visit the VA Regional Office? The first three days of the month and any Monday.

As of November, it took approximately 36 days from receipt of an application for vocational rehabilitation to the date the VA notified the veteran of the decision on eligibility.

There are approximately 138,320 veterans currently residing in Idaho, and 20,262 of them are in receipt of disability benefits. The VA also issues monthly benefits to 350 widows, orphans, and dependent parents of Idaho's veterans. In 2013, VA issued monthly benefits amounting to \$20.9 million to Idaho's veterans. This amount equals over \$250 million per year to support Idaho's disabled veterans, their dependents, and survivors.

## BIG GAME HUNT OFFERED FOR 2 DISABLED VETERANS

The Idaho Division of Veteran Services will be coordinating an all-expense-paid deer or elk hunt for two disabled veterans in 2015. The purpose of the hunt is to offer disabled veterans an opportunity to participate in a big-game hunt that might otherwise be prevented by the seriousness of their disability.

Tags are provided at no charge to the successful applicant by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game under a special program. The selected veterans may choose antlered or antlerless deer or elk in compliance with established seasons. Specific tag information will be provided to the selected veteran. The hunt will occur on a private ranch in Unit 45, north of Mountain Home, Idaho. Hunt dates will need to be coordinated well in advance, based on established seasons. In most cases, hunts occur in October or early November. Hunters will be expected to provide their own transportation to Mountain Home or Boise. Rustic cabin/bunkhouse accommodations, meals, and on-site transportation and assistance will be provided at the ranch at no cost to the veteran. If the veteran has or requires a medical caregiver, these items will also be provided at no charge for the caregiver. The cabin/bunkhouse is not barrier-free, so hotel accommodations in Mountain Home will be provided if necessary. Hunters will need to make arrangements for their prescription and medical supplies, if any. Hunters will be responsible for their own meat processing and mounting in the event their hunt is successful.

All personal information submitted will be confidential and used only by the selection committee.

A committee consisting of personnel from Idaho Division of Veterans Services and Idaho veterans will make the final selections. The selected veterans will be notified by the Idaho Division of Veterans Services and will be contacted by the ranch to coordinate hunt dates and other specifics. Applications must be submitted no later than April 30, 2015.
